Now in its 4th year, the Architecture+Design Film Festival (A+DFF) Winnipeg presents critically acclaimed films focusing on the importance of architecture and design in everyday life. The films cover a range of design-oriented topics from architecture, landscape and urban design to graphics and product design. This year the films are from England, Spain, Italy, Netherlands, France, USA and Canada. Primarily documentaries, we are also showing fictional feature and short films, which explore our built environment with great humour.

The festival is unique in Canada and provides an opportunity to see a range of short and feature length films, newly released or in limited release. The 2015 festival will open with the Canadian documentary, *Strange and Familiar:* Architecture of Fogo Island, which documents the artists' studios and new Fogo Island Inn, designed by architect Todd Saunders. This project has been showcased in more than 80 international magazines for its beautiful design but also innovative community development goals. We are pleased that film-makers Katherine Knight and Marcia Connelly will be present for a post-film discussion.



Secrets of the Parthenon

In anticipation of the arrival of the exhibition, Olympus: The Greco-Roman Collections of Berlin, the WAG is thrilled to offer a special screening of Secrets of the Parthenon in collaboration with the 2015 Architecture and Design Film Festival. This exciting episode from the Nova PBS

Documentary Collection not only explores the Parthenon as an enduring symbol of Ancient Greece, Athenian democracy, Western civilization and one of the world's greatest cultural monuments, but highlights the current program of selective restoration and reconstruction carried out by The Greek Ministry of Culture to ensure the stability of the partially ruined structure.

Strange and Familiar: Architecture of Fogo Island

Katherine Knight and Marcia Connolly 2014, Canada, 55 minutes, English Prologue by Michael J. Cox, architect, Brandon

The filmmakers, Katherine Knight and Marcia Connelly, will be in attendance.

"Architect Todd Saunders' sculpture-like artist studios perched on the rocky shores of Fogo Island created a buzz among worldwide architecture fans when the first images were released. Since then, the four artists studios and the new Fogo Island Inn have been documented in more than 80 international magazines. The striking buildings are located in an



equally dramatic natural setting that is the rugged sub-arctic landscape of Fogo Island, a small, remote rocky outcrop off the coast of Newfoundland, imbuing each structure with the spirit of the 'new' and finding a winning balance between the strange and familiar. Gorgeously photographed over all four seasons the film is a flowing, visual narrative that unfolds over time as the Fogo Island Inn is being constructed. Zita Cobb's belief in the tension of opposites as a positive force in human experience is reflected in the film. The Inn is totally modern yet filled with textures inherited from the past. The idea of moving forward while reaching back is tangible in the juxtaposition of old and new architecture. Extensive interviews with Todd Saunders and Zita Cobb provide intimate insight into the personalities and motivations behind the creation of adventurous contemporary architecture. An extensive cast of local residents provides the real-world context in which the buildings exist. This is a portrait of a little island that wants to be relevant in a big and current way." —sitemedia.ca

"The architect Peter Zumthor lives and works in the remote village of Haldenstein in the Swiss Kanton of Graubünden. Here, keeping the politics of architecture at a comfortable distance, Zumthor enjoys the status of "world-class" architect for his unique modernist buildings... Visiting him in his studio, where he would be



surrounded by drawings and marquettes turned out to be a good idea. Critic Kenneth Frampton questioned him during a tour of his current work and about his pioneering earlier works, such as the Spa in Vals, for which he received much early recognition, and the recent much acclaimed Kolumba, the museum of the archdiocese of Cologne, Germany."

Citizen Lambert: Joan of Architecture

A unique glimpse into the world of Phyllis Lambert, renowned Canadian architect, urban activist, patron and founder of the Canadian Centre for Architecture in Montreal, *Citizen Lambert: Joan of Architecture* paints a vibrant portrait of a figure so often presented one-dimensionally in the press.

The public story of Phyllis
Lambert is told through a
prologue loosely conceived as a
parody of Citizen Kane's "News
on the March." These newsreellike sequences detail Lambert's
many accomplishments—such
as commissioning Mies van der
Rohe to design the Seagram
Building in New York in the
1950s; directing photographic
missions from the early 1970s



to document historic architecture; her role as an urban guerrilla in the landmark Milton-Parc housing renovation project; founding Heritage Montréal in 1975; and forming the collections which led to her founding the CCA as a research centre and museum. This public Phyllis contrasts sharply with the private Phyllis presented through the montage of footage shot in Lambert's home with director Teri Wehn-Damisch. This is Phyllis Lambert uncensored, in her own words, in her own world. The figure that emerges from Wehn-Damisch's composite portrait is that of a visionary thinker with boundless energy, a feisty woman driven by joyful ambition, a free spirit.

The Nature of Modernism: E. Stewart Williams

Produced by Jake Gorst and Tracey Rennie 2014, USA, 79 minutes, English Prologue by Joe Kalturnyk, RAW: Gallery of Architecture & Design





When Frank Sinatra walked into E. Stewart Williams' newly-established architectural office in May 1947, he wanted a Georgian-style house built in the desert of Palm Springs. Williams tactfully convinced him of the benefits of modernism, and Sinatra went for it. The two had no idea how far reaching and influential that decision would prove to be. The house was the first in a string of mid-century modernist gems that still define the look and feel of the Coachella Valley, and

which would come to include Crafton Hills College, Palm Springs Desert Museum (now Palm Springs Art Museum), and Santa Fe Federal Savings, now the museum's Architecture and Design Center. Design Onscreen's film by Jake Gorst and Tracey Rennie Gorst makes extensive use of E. Stewart Williams' personal archival photographs and voice recordings to shed new light on a remarkable career.

who writes, "Hugh Kaptur's architecture reveals intriguing new dimensions to Palm Springs' masterful collection of Mid-Century Modern designs."



Sign Painters celebrates the hand painted sign industry, an American tradition and stylistically explores this unacknowledged art form through anecdotal accounts from artists across the country. This documentary explores a fascinating insight into a highly specialized underground trade, emphasizing an appreciation for a balance between art and commerce.

The Advertising Association of Winnipeg has launched a new research project aimed at creating a digital archive of Ghost Signs in Winnipeg's Exchange District. The year-long undertaking will focus on cataloguing ghost signs in the area, developing a history of the products and documenting the painters behind the work. This research will be compiled and launched in the spring 2015 as an interactive website at www.ghostsigns.ca.

Ghost signs are hand-painted, outdoor ads that have been preserved on sides of buildings. They are also known as fading ads or brick ads and were prevalent from the 1890s through to the 1960s. As outdoor advertising mediums evolved, ghost signs became a less popular way of advertising products and services and were replaced by billboards and vinyl banners.

The screening will be followed by a free tour of "Ghost Signs" in the Exchange District, led by Matt Cohen, President, Advertising Association of Winnipeg.

Estate, a Reverie

Directed by Andrea Luka Zimmerman 2015, UK, 83 minutes, English Prologue by Hannah_g, Ace Art



Estate, a Reverie is a poetic documentary film essay that tracks the passing of the massive Haggerston Estate in Hackney, London, and the utopian promise of social housing it offered when it was built in the 1930s. After decades of lack of maintenance, the whole area was condemned. The last building, Samuel House, was the home of the filmmaker until it demolished in the fall of 2014.

Filmed over the final seven years, Estate, a Reverie reveals and celebrates the resilience of marginalized people who live

their lives at the mercy of governmental and financial decisions. It also shows how new forms of community took form among the residents as the date for the final move approached, offering valuable insights in social processes in cities. Perhaps it is not just a question of where we live, but how? With music composed and performed by Olivia Chaney.

Through clever overlapping of archival photos of downtown Winnipeg buildings with surface parking lots, Lorne Bailey offers a deadpan commentary on how we have lost many historic landmarks. These buildings include the Grace Church, Empire Hotel, and the McIntyre Block on Main Street.

Mon Oncle

Directed by Jacques Tati 1958, France, 116 minutes, French with English subtitles Prologue by Lisa Landrum, Professor of Architecture, University of Manitoba

The awkward but elegant Monsieur Hulot visits his sister's family at their quirky modern home and garden, and attempts to take a respectable job at the humourless plastic hose factory owned by his portly bourgeoise brother in law. Poking fun at gadgetry and the car obsessed modern suburban landscape, while revelling in the charming persistence of the nearby town centre Mon Oncle is an amusing satire of the modern lifestyle of materialist suburbanites. This Academy Award-winning film is as relevant today as it ever was—especially perhaps in Winnipeg where enlightened critiques of suburbia and modernity have yet to fully land and where those who cherish the creative force of anachronism tend to thrive.

The New Rijksmuseum

Directed by Oeke Hoogendijk 2014, Netherlands, 93 minutes, Dutch/Spanish with English subtitles Prologue by Leona Herzog, independent curator, previously at Manitoba Hydro



In 2003 an optimistic start was made with the renovation of the Rijksmusuem in Amsterdam. The Netherlands major tourist attraction would re-open its doors in fresh splendour in 2008. But alas, right from the start the project was opposed by unyielding counter forces and Rembrandt's palace was slowly transformed into an apparently permanent building site. This unique and prize winning epic documentary was filmed behind the closed doors of the Museum for ten years.

Cecil Balmond: Visionary Engineer and Architect

"In conversations with the architecture critic Sanford Kwinter, Cecil Balmond reveals his vision and multifaceted talents in a retrospective exhibition of his accomplishments at the Graham Foundation Gallery in Chicago. 'The impossible made possible. This is how I regard Cecil's influence on contemporary architecture. Through his commitment to experimentation and belief in structure as a creative act he has helped realize some of the most thrilling buildings of the last thirty years,' said Sarah Herda, curator of the exhibition... Since the early 1980s Balmond has collaborated with such

important contemporary architects and artists working today as Toyo Ito, Anish Kapoor, Rem Koolhaas, Daniel Libeskind and Alvaro Siza. Balmond has introduced innovative structural concepts that have resulted in some of the most challenging buildings in the canon of contemporary architecture... He founded the Advanced Geometry Unit (AGU) in 2000, a research based practice, which is comprised of architects, artists, engineers, and scientists, to pursue his interest in the genesis of form using numbers, music, and mathematics as vital sources."
